

The Associate Dean for Access and Equity is the lead administrator in the college who oversees initiatives related to access, equity, diversity, inclusion, and belonging. Among their key responsibilities are: advancing access, equity, diversity, inclusion, belonging, and retention efforts for students, staff, and faculty in the college; supporting a college-wide culture that embraces individual identities, fosters a culture of inclusion, belonging, and promotes equity and equitable practices; assessing and promoting the impact of these efforts through policies and practices within the college. In this role, the associate dean will provide leadership in collaborating with the college community towards pursuing and achieving the goals articulated in the college's strategic plan dedicated to establishing a culture of anti-racism, anti-oppression, and equity through our values, standards, ideals, policies, and practices. The associate dean engages with faculty, staff, students, administrators, alumni, donors, and friends within and outside of the college to advance these initiatives and to realize these goals.

Inaugurated in the 2021-22 AY, this office has developed a three-phase course of action that started with (1) groundwork to research, learn about, and listen to the concerns of the college community around existing goals and any other issues around equitable practices, policies, and cultures of belonging; and (2) an assessment of those findings that is informing (3) a multi-year plan that specifies a collective vision and includes systems of reporting and accountability consistent with the college's overall strategic plan. The entire college community should expect to continue to engage in robust conversations and other mechanisms of inclusion as we refine a collective vision where everyone can thrive and contribute to a culture that enables us to be productive academic and artistic leaders with innovative and progressive research and practices in the arts and design.

Safety

Penn State falls under the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) Laws and Regulations. In addition to following OSHA regulations, Penn State has their own safety policies. Worker's Compensation is administered through the Penn State Office for Worker's Compensation. It is your obligation to notify your department head or director if you are injured while working, so your claim can be submitted. After initial treatment, if you need additional treatment, you must continue to visit a professional from the Penn State list of Physicians and Health Care Providers for 90 days from the date of your first visit. After 90 days, if you still need treatment, you may seek care from a provider of your choice but must notify the Penn State Office for Worker's Compensation in order for the treatment to be considered for payment.

If there is an incident or injury to a student or a person that is not employed by Penn State, the Incident Form is required. The Incident Report form is also required for reporting any type of incident while traveling on field trips with students. Constitution of College Faculty (Faculty Council)

This constitution establishes the organization of the College Faculty within the College of Arts and Architecture and confirms the College of Arts and Architecture Faculty Council as the elected representative voice of the College Faculty both within the College and throughout the University. As an elected representative body, it shall serve to support the academic and curricular activities of the College and its individual units. The authority vested in this constitution has been delegated by the University Faculty Senate. The Faculty Council's responsibility is to seek the guidance of the faculty and serve its will through legislative, forensic, advisory and consultative duties delegated by the University Faculty Senate and described in this document. This constitution establishes the procedure by which College of Arts and Architecture Faculty can initiate referenda, engage in effective dialog, and impact decisions of the elected representatives of the College Faculty.

Health Advocate Employee Assistance Program (EAP)

<u>Health Advocate</u> is a free and voluntary resource that has been provided for benefits-eligible employees, their spouse, dependent children, parents, and parents-in-law. Eligible family members do not have to reside with the employee in order to participate.

Health Advocate offers two valuable services, accessible through one phone number, 866-799-2728.

EAP+Work/Life program

A licensed EAP professional can provide short-term counseling by phone, email, or in person to help you better cope with personal, family and work issues. You and your eligible members will still have up to 5 in-person visits per issue. On the work/life side, specialists can help you locate the right support services, from childcare and eldercare to legal and financial help.

Healthcare Help

You have unlimited access to a highly trained Personal Health Advocate (PHA), who can help you navigate the healthcare and insurance systems, efficiently and dependably. The PHA can help you find the right providers, negotiate fees on uncovered medical bills, locate second opinions, provide cost comparisons for medical procedures and much more.

What is the employee assistance program (EAP)?

Penn State's EAP is a free, confidential employee and family resource to be used as a first line of defense for personal or work-related concerns for yourself or your family. Penn State has contracted this program through Health Advocate, a leading EAP provider and the 2011 Global Winner of Workforce Magazine's Optimas Award in the Service category.

What are some of the features of the health advocate EAP?

How often can I use EAP?

There is no limit to the number of times all benefits-eligible employees, their spouse, dependent children, parents and parents-in-law can use the EAP. There are no fees for calling the EAP or for your face-to-face visits with a local therapist (up to five free face-to-face visits per concern, with no limit to the number of concerns that may need to be addressed).
